Finding "No Man's Land": A Christmas Wish

When we look about our world today and listen, if we are able, to daily reports of human's inhumanity to human, I wonder what has happened to the spirit of Christmas. We only have to take in the early morning news to hear of death and destruction in almost every corner of our world.

In the western world we have begun celebrating 100 years since troops left to go to what is now known as WW1. I wish for this Christmas we might also celebrate something else that happened 100 years ago. Something that has intrigued me for years; how soldiers fighting in WW1 created their own cessation of war. They sang Christmas Carols across the trenches and eventually as Christmas

morning broke, climbed out of those same trenches and crossed on to “No Man’s Land,” calling out “Merry Christmas” in their enemies’ native tongues. Sceptical, the Allied soldiers feared it was a trick, but seeing the soldiers unarmed they climbed out of their trenches and shook hands with the enemy soldiers. The men exchanged presents of buttons and food and sang carols and songs. There was even a documented case of soldiers from opposing sides playing a good-natured game of soccer.

What has happened in our world when we have lost the Spirit needed to initiate such a change? Maybe this year we could, in our own way, find a “No Man’s Land.” A place safe enough for all to greet each other in equality and share what gifts, great or small, we have to offer. Certainly “No Man’s Land;” rather sacred ground, one filled with a Spirit of Love, Hope and Peace.

May the hope of finding sacred ground, where all can stand in awe, bathed in the love of Christ, be yours this Christmas. With my love and prayers,

What do you do with yourself:

I am a second year University student. I'm studying Early Childhood Education and Care (age group from birth to 6 years) in the Institute of Technology Carlow, Co. Carlow, Ireland. I work part-time in a local restaurant as a waitress on the weekends, and I also babysit at the weekends.



How did you first become involved with GFS?:

What is your current involvement in GFS?:

Continue to find strength and peace through your faith in God and keep serving in The Girls Friendly Society. All of us are here for each other and never forget it.

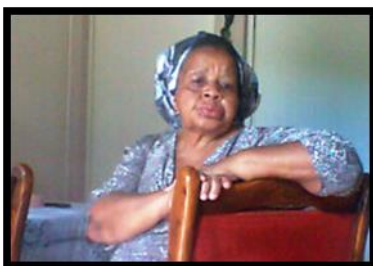
Drafting the newsletter at the same time listening to the news I thank God that the Minister in the Presidency informs the citizens that the remains of some of the 81 South Africans who in September 12 died in a collapsed building of the synagogue church in Nigeria will, before next week be transported home so that the relatives can get closure. I am

sharing this as part of bearing one another's burden.

The association in the country is striving to address the statement "called to serve through GFS" and also responding to the question of how the GBFS is doing, will grow the Kingdom of God.

Part of the response is motivating people to be united in Christ, that of working together with other youth organisations in the Anglican Church. The Mothers Union is working very well with GBFS in our country. They are the mothers of the young people that we are leading. They give support to the activities that the association is involved in below is one example

International day of prayer was successfully celebrated almost in all the Dioceses. The celebrations were in different styles with a touch of cultural dance but all dioceses used the service which was prepared by New Zealand. Part of responding to how the GBFS will grow the Kingdom of God, during this period the association has established new branches and commissioned about 300 new members, people who are to bear one another's burden. I know with God's help they will accomplish their mission.

USA

There are two articles from the USA! I saw some of the photos from Los Angeles Diocese on Facebook and loved the one I am printing – such happiness in GFS - so asked if they would send me a short article. Delores has sent a very interesting resource that could be used in branches. (from Val)

The Diocese of Los Angeles celebrated the World Day of Prayer as part of a newly styled Fall event named GFS Day 2014. It was a day to celebrate who we are as a community and as a part of the larger worldwide GFS organization.



The hosting chapter, St. Mark's in Upland, made tissue paper pompoms as decorations and served as the hostesses for the event.

Girls aged 3 through 20 came from all over the diocese. They first colored a hand print on sandpaper, which will be ironed onto a tablecloth for GFS Japan. This gift will be sent to Japan in hopes that it will be used for worship or for hospitality and represents our desire to "bear one another's burdens."

The day began with the 2014 World Day of Prayer service from our sisters in New Zealand. It included Eucharist, a sermon involving a magic trick, and a collection for the GFS World Project. One of the guests of honor was a

Japanese ceremonial doll given to our diocese in 1956 by the diocese of Japan. She has held up very well over the past 50 years and is a treasured part of GFS.

Our theme for the GFS Day celebration was a Dance Off. This activity encouraged the girls to work together in their branches to create a dance that included all members, from kindergarten to high school. Canned goods were collected as an "Admission Fee" and were donated to the local food pantry. Six of the thirteen chapters participated in the Dance Off, with styles ranging from modern dance to hip hop. Awards were given in categories including Best Choreography, Best Overall, Best Soloist, and most likely to win "So You Think You Can Dance". Finally, the floor was turned over to the girls and leaders for free dance. It was a day full of fun and laughter and music.

The Symbolism of the Chrismon Tree

Some of our branches in the USA display a Chrismon Tree in their Church. For two thousand years, Christians all over the world have celebrated Christ's birthday, each country according to its own traditional interpretation of the holy day. They were symbols used by early Christians as a symbol of faith. In days when it was dangerous to be a Christian, followers of Jesus used secret signs and symbols to communicate with other Christians. The Chrismon Tree is decorated with the symbols that tell the story of God's love.

The word, "Chrismon" is a combination of two words, "Christ" and "monogram." A Chrismon is just that -- a monogram of Christ. All the Chrismons are made in combinations of white and gold. White is the liturgical color for Christmas, referring to Christ's purity and perfection. Gold refers to His majesty and glory. "Christ, the Light of the World" is indicated by using tiny clear white lights.

The Chrismon Tree was first developed by Frances Kipps Spencer at Ascension Lutheran Church in Danville, Virginia, USA. She set out to create decorations appropriate for a church Christmas tree. Centuries-old symbols depict the Life of Christ and tiny white lights reflect the purity of our Savior as they decorate the evergreen tree in the Church. Chrismons add their white and gold beauty to the Christmas season and make the celebration of our Lord's birth more meaningful by emphasizing God's great Gift to the world, our Savior Jesus Christ.

GFS USA would like to share the idea of the Chrismon Tree with our GFS Sister's around the world. Below are some symbols that are common Chrismons and what they represent to Christians today.



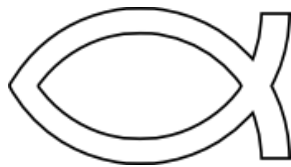
The Cross symbolizes that Christians believe Jesus Christ died for everyone on a Cross.



The Latin Cross, also sometimes called the Roman Cross. The base of the Cross has three steps that symbolize faith, hope, and love.



The Anchor Cross reminds Christians that Jesus is the anchor of their faith.



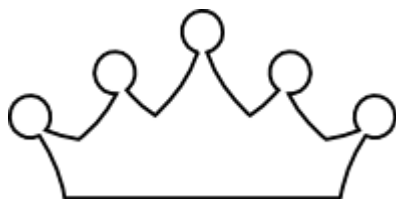
The Fish is one of the oldest Christian symbols. The letters, from the Greek word for fish (ichthus), stand for Jesus (I), Christ (X), God (Q), Son (Y), Savior (S). Some of Jesus' disciples were fishermen.



The Star of David, sometimes called the Star of Creation, is a symbol that Jesus was a Jew and a descendant of King David.



A Five Pointed Star represents the five wounds of Jesus on the cross.



The Crown is the symbol that Jesus is King. It shows that Christians believe Jesus is ruler over heaven and the earth.



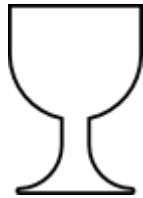
The Shepherd's Crook or Staff remembers that Jesus sometimes called himself a shepherd. It can also represent the shepherds who were the first people told about the birth of Jesus.



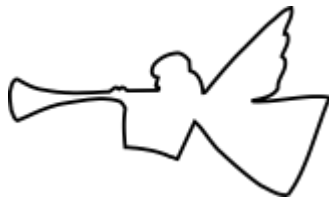
Hands in Prayer help Christians remember that they should pray to God.



The Dove is the symbol of peace and the Holy Spirit. It is shown pointing down to represent the Holy Spirit that appeared as a Dove when Jesus was baptized.



The Cup or Chalice is a symbol of the Mass, Eucharist or Communion. It also represents God's forgiveness.



The Angel reminds Christians of the angels who told the shepherds about the birth of Jesus. It can also represent the second coming of Jesus, which the bible says will start with an Angel blowing a trumpet.



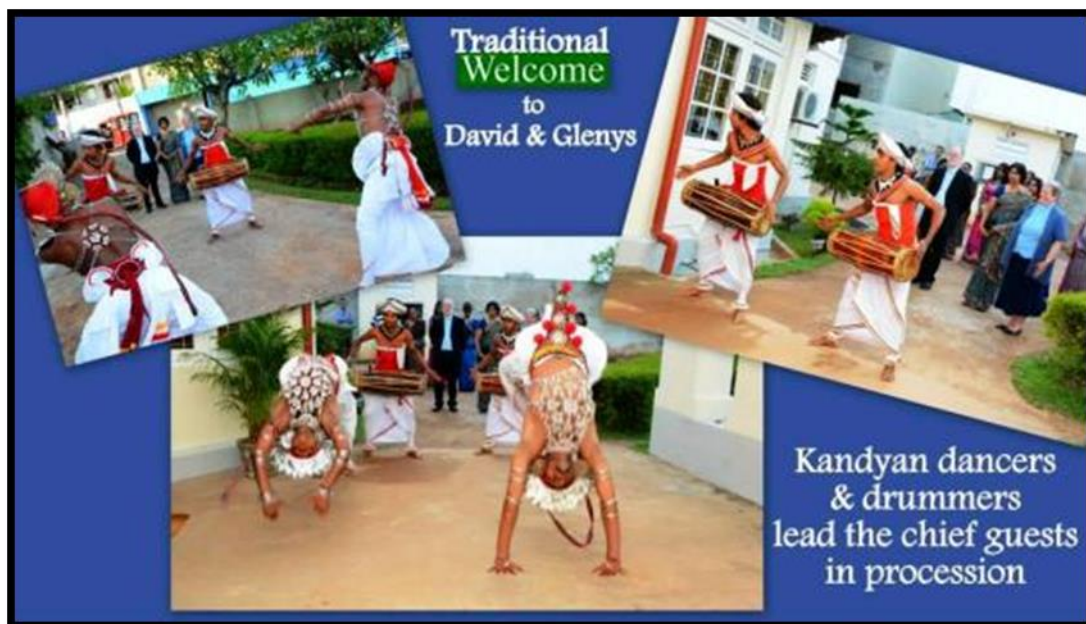
The Heart is a symbol of love and reminds Christians that God is love.
