## THE CREATION OF GFS

The Girls' Friendly Society was founded in London in 1875 by an Irishwoman, Mrs (Mary) Elizabeth Townsend, to help lonely girls who came from the country to work in the city. This was the first girls' or women's organisation in the Church of England. It was a society for friendship and recreation in which all girls might share, bound together in a fellowship of Christian love and service. The rapidly spreading movement came quickly to Ireland, Scotland and America in 1877, continuing in quick succession to Australia and other countries worldwide.

Now our Society is alive and serving girls and women in all those countries of the world where our Church is to be found. The motto, purpose and prayer have not changed down the years but one generation after another has found fresh inspiration in them.

Date	Event
1877	→ 22 <sup>nd</sup> February - First meeting in Ireland to make plans to form a GFS in Ireland; venue: The Marine Hotel in Bray, County Wicklow. In attendance: Viscountess Powerscourt (Presiding), Viscountess Monck, The Hon Mrs Greene, Mrs La Touche, Rev'd J G Scott (Rector), Rev'd J A Cross (Hon Sec). Mrs C F Alexander (Hymn Writer) was one of seventeen Working Associates appointed. (Five more were appointed at a later date).
1878	→ First office opened with Miss La Touche as Registrar or Secretary - girls helped to find suitable jobs here.
1880	→ First GFS hostel and recreational centre opened - Molesworth Street, Dublin and later Frederick Street.
1884	→ Queen Victoria became Patron - sent £50. → Ireland gave lead in starting Candidates.
1885	→ Emigration Department opened to help girls going to Canada & USA.
1889	→ Decision made that GFS members can not belong to more than one branch.
1893	→ The Countess Dowager of Meath (the Foundress of GFS in Ireland) elected as an Honary Life Member of the Central Council and Mrs Elizabeth Townsend (the Foundress of the parent society) elected as an Honary Life Member of the Irish Central Council.
1900	→ Queen Victoria visited Dublin and the new GFS Hostel in Rostrevor, County Down named after her as a memorial of her visit.

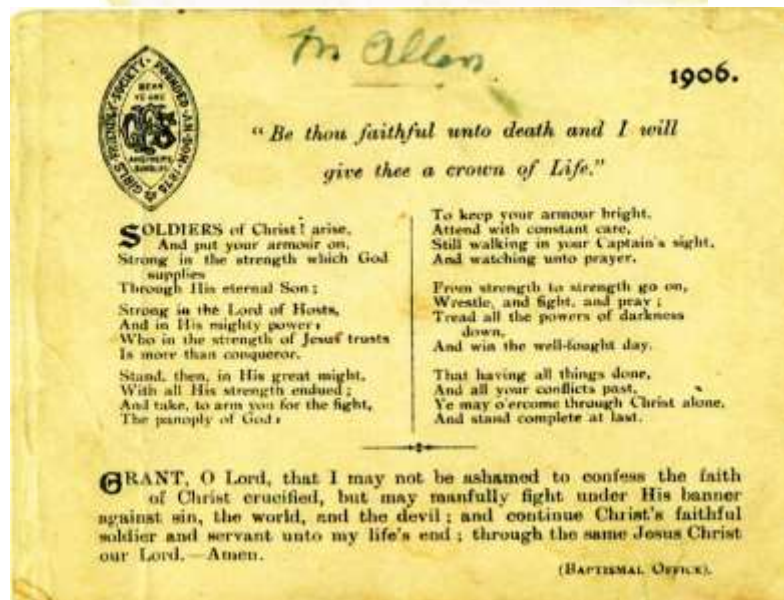
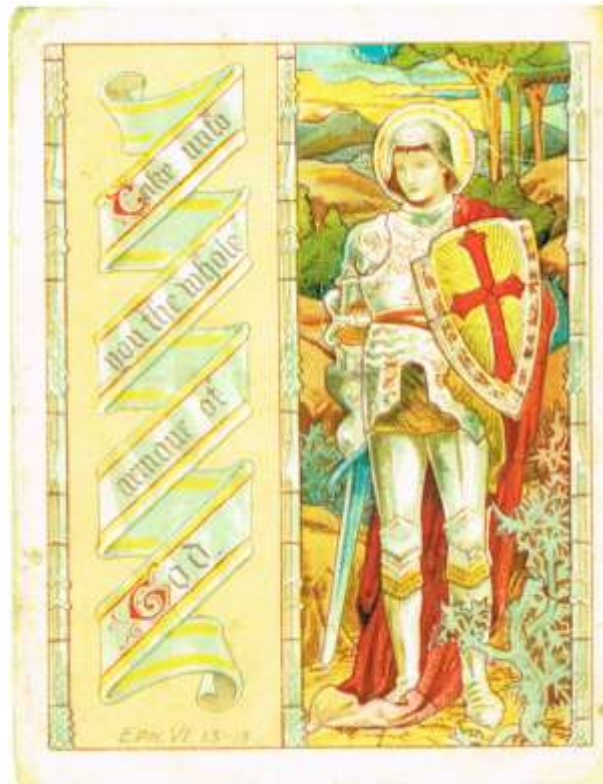



1908	→ Queen Mary became our Patron.
1910	→ Larger hostel opened in Upper Merrion Street, Dublin.
1914	→ Various War work undertaken, Savings Group, Club for War nurses (Q.M.A.A.C.) 'Vigilance' work started. Hospital beds endowed, etc.
1919	→ Victory Fete held in Mansion House, Dublin -£1,000 raised to repair Rostrevor Hostel in County Down.
1927	→ Jubilee year, many celebrations to raise money to buy new GFS House. Money presented at a Pageant using 'Oak leaf' symbols. → Jubilee Banner of St Brigid presented to St Patrick's Cathedral, Dublin.
1928	→ GFS pledge card against 'betting' issued to members; card reads "I promise with God's help not to bet, or help others to do so, while I retain this card".
1929	→ 'Oak House' purchased at 34 St Stephen's Green, Dublin for £4,000.00 and the organisation moved in there in 1930. → GFS had been spreading through the World wherever the Anglican Church was to be found.
1933	→ "The Oak Tree" painting commissioned by GFS is completed by artist Miss Helen Colville (GFS); the painting was later reframed in 1990.
1937	→ Queen Elizabeth ("the Queen Mother") became Patron of GFS.
1944	→ Miss Florence Ross Todd resumes the office of President after a long illness; Council wished Miss Todd to receive the highest honour possible and so is made "President Emeritus" → Committee sanctioned an optional uniform, similar to that worn by GFS in England, consisting of a blue dress, a blue forage cap or alternatively the forage cap, an armlet with monogram and a blue tie. →
